Biographical information:

Anne Fournier Deschaine was born 7 August 1929 in St-Basile, New Brunswick. She is the daughter of Aimé Fournier and Olive Clavette. Her father was a lumberjack for the Fraser company for many years.

Anne married Réginald Deschaine in 1950 and had 6 children. Anne has made a career with her special talent as an organist. For 24 years she played at Sunday services and other events for the church in St. David, Maine and played for 16 years at the church in Madawaska. She is now retired and living in Madawaska where she enjoys reading and playing the piano everyday for her enjoyment.

Anne mentioned that the song they recorded "Le premier clocher" came about when the parish was celebrating the bicentennial and a competition was on for finding a song to commemorate this special event. They didn't win the competition but they thought that the words to the song were so meaningful and expressive that Anne decided to put music to the words and got the Saint-Basile Choir to perform the song. They (Anne and her sister Emma Yvonne) eventually brought a copy of their recording to the Archives.

Emma Yvonne Fournier is Anne Fournier Deschaine's sister. Emma Yvonne was born 8 July 1922 in Saint-Basile, New Brunswick and is the daughter of Aimé Fournier and Olive Clavette. Emma Yvonne has a Bachelor degree in Education and taught for 14 years as her third career.

Scope and content:

This collection consists of materials pertaining to "Le Premier Clocher" ("The First Steeple"), a commemorative hymn written for Saint-Basile parish's bicentennial celebrations in 1992. Emma Yvonne Fournier wrote the lyrics, while Anne F. Deschaine wrote the music. Included are photocopies of sheet music for "Le Premier Clocher" in the following variations: solo melody and piano accompaniment and lyrics in French; fourpart chorale arrangement and lyrics in French; music and lyrics in French; and an English translation with music and lyrics. An audio cassette recorded at Studio Madouess in Iroquois, NB on April 6, 1992, containing the song is included. The performers are Michèle Lévesque, Diane Albert, sopranos; Camille Roy, Gilles Lévesque, Richard Albert, tenors; Adrienne Roy, Marielle Levesque, altos; and Conrad Soucy and Arthur Cyr, bass. Also contained in the collection are a poem, "Saint-Basile," written by Emma Yvonne Fournier about "Le Premier Clocher" in 1992, in both manuscript and typescript forms; a program from the March 19, 1992 Feast of St. Joseph mass celebration at St. Joseph convent in Saint-Basile, New Brunswick; and a program from the July 5, 1992 bicentennial mass celebration in Saint-Basile.

Description: The song "Le premier clocher" describes why our ancestors came to settle in the Madawaska region and why they decided to build a church.
