Biographical information: Roger Damboise was born in Caribou, Maine, the son of Pierre Damboise and Yvonne Cote. He attended sculpting school in St-Jean-Port-Joli, Quebec, every summer from 1998 through 2005. He taught in the Madawaska, Maine, school system for 34 years, retiring in 2002. Damboise teaches mandolin and guitar lessons. In addition to sculpting and painting, he also sings with Les Chanteurs Acadiens.

Scope and content:

This collection consists of four wood cuttings created by Roger Damboise. Wood cuttings are created by carving a relief sculpture into a plane of wood; this differs from wood engraving, which is defined by carving into the grain end of a wood block (definition from the Getty Institute *Art and Architecture Thesaurus*). Two of the wood cuttings are dated 1999 and 2001; the other two cuttings are undated.
