Biographical information: Bertrand Cyr is the son of Octave Cyr and Eva Sirois from St. Agatha, Maine. Bertrand is an alumnus from the class of 1970 of the University of Maine at Fort Kent. He was president of Fort Kent State College Student Senate in 1969. Bertrand taught many years for the Madawaska School Department. He now resides in Hermon, Maine.

Historical information: Re: Higher Education Planning Commission, 1969

The Legislature, guided by the deliberations of the Lund Committee, adopted the fundamental proposal of a single university system.... The chancellor, Donald McNeil.....appointed this Higher Education Planning Commission in the spring of 1969 to priorities questions facing the Chancellor and the Legislature on what commitment should the University make in the future toward providing two-year programs below the baccalaureate level and what should be the mission or role of each part of the University.

The Commission considered whether the college in Fort Kent should close but the special needs for the St. John Valley area for higher education opportunity led the Commission to conclude the college should not be closed but have a curriculum that would provide a two-year college transfer program which would prepare students for entry as Juniors at any of the four-year campuses of the University.¹

In short, the HEP Commission report suggested that the Fort Kent State College be downgraded from a four-year college to a two-year Community College serving the St. John Valley and in doing so would reduce the financial burden of the system.

Historical information: Maine Humanities Council: When the arts community persuaded the Johnson Administration in the 1960s to offer modest funding to the nation's performing and visual artists, the scholarly community responded: why not offer federal support to the humanities as well? Government had generously funded science and technology: was cultural activity not just as important for the nation's future?

The result was the National Endowment for the Humanities, established in 1965 and still flourishing. Among other initiatives, the NEH channels federal funds to state humanities councils, to encourage locally based projects for all Americans.

In 1971, Maine was one of the first states to experiment with these programs. Its Maine State Commission on the Arts and Humanities went through several name changes before finally settling in 1981 on the Maine Humanities Council.

While many of the pilot programs had a strong public policy focus (to make them palatable in a political world still somewhat suspicious of "culture"), the MHC soon found its own identity as

an intensely community oriented nonprofit. It sought ways to help Mainers understand their lives as thinking human beings and as beneficiaries of the state's rich historic culture.²

Scope and content: This collection consists of nine (9) audio cassettes. One audio cassette is a speech by Bertrand Cyr, Student Senate President at the Fort Kent State College (now University of Maine at Fort Kent) regarding the Higher Education Planning Commission report of 1969 suggesting the Fort Kent State College be downgraded from a 4-year college to a 2-year Community College.

Eight of the audio cassettes are part of a Maine Humanities Council Lecture Series given in 1983 in Fort Kent and Madawaska. On October 27, 1983, Beatrice Craig gave a lecture on the *Beginning of the Madawaska and Aroostook Settlements*; on December 7, 1983, Dr. David C. Smith gave a lecture on *Life in the Maine Woods & on Maine Farms*; on December 15, 1983, Dr. Stephen Marini, gave a lecture on *Religions of Maine*; undated, Alan Taylor gave a lecture on the *Treasure Chest of Daniel Lambert*.
