**Biographical information:** Joseph 'Joe' Nadeau was born January 22, 1925, in Winterville, Maine, the son of Ernest Nadeau and Mamie Soucy. Mr. Nadeau was a veteran of foreign wars. He served in the U.S. Army in the Office of Strategic Services. Joe worked for the Great Northern Paper Company as a forester for 45 years. He worked for Charlie Leadbetter for more than 30 years while working part time for the local telephone company for 43 years. His

enjoyment was his family and volunteering for Catholic Charity of Caribou and St. Mary's Parish, Eagle Lake. He took pride in taking care of the family farm on Soucy Hill. Mr. Nadeau died on July 25, 2012.

***Scope and content:*** This collection consists of one large blueprint of numbered land lots in the towns of Frenchville, St. Agatha, Fort Kent, Wallagrass, New Canada, T17 R5 (Cross Lake), and T17 R4 (Wels (Sinclair)). No owners' names are written on the land lots. H. J. (Henry?) Pelletier, civil engineer, did the blueprint in 1931. Tracing and additions were done by J.R. Sinclair in May 1939 and seemed to have been updated by J.R.(Joh Roy) and H. K. (Hollis Kermit) Sinclair in May 1947. The surveyor's scale is measured in chains. The map's dimensions are 46 inches x 30.5 inches. The map is yellowed and brittle and a small area of the map was secured by tape.
