Biographical information: **William Dickey (1810-1899)** was born in Damariscotta, Maine on January 26, 1810 to John Dickey and Margaret Jones. He worked his way through Farmington Academy; taught in Wilton, Maine; worked in a store in Strong, Maine; in 1832 went in business for himself; was elected captain of the Strong Light Infantry; was promoted by Governor Dunlap to brigade major of the Second Brigade, Eight Division and was known as Major Dickey from then on. He served as postmaster of Strong, deputy sheriff and coroner, and was elected as representative to the legislature in 1841. He was considered "the promptest and most generous man in recognizing the new rights of the Acadian and Canadian settlers of river St. John on the

American side.” As a true public servant, Major Dickey embarked on a legislative career to bring roads, bridges, schools, and his crowning achievement, a normal school to the Madawaska Territory. For over 30 years he has been the representative of Fort Kent in the legislature and for over 40 years he has been the friend, the counselor, the protector, the father of the people of Madawaska.¹

Major Dickey is buried in Christ Congregational Church Cemetery in Fort Kent, Maine.

Vetal Cyr 1846 – 1897. Mr. Cyr was the son of Salomon Cyr and Olive Michaud from the St. John Valley, Maine. He was a graduate of Houlton Academy and the State College in Orono in the class of 1876. Mr. Cyr was the first principal of the Madawaska Training School from 1878 to 1897 and served as town superintendent of common schools. When Mr. Cyr passed away on September 22, 1897, it was said that the MTS had lost a “Principal and a teacher of the highest distinction.” Mr. Cyr was believed to be cheerful, kind, cordial, wise, and efficient. It is mentioned that Mr. Cyr was “the most painstaking and efficient members of the teaching profession and a man who had not only a broad interest in education in general, but a deep interest in the welfare of each individual student who came under his care.”

Mary P. Nowland was the Madawaska Training School second principal from 1897 to 1926. Mary Nowland was born on November 23, 1853 in Hodgdon, Maine, the daughter of James Nowland and Helen Parker. She died in 1932 and is buried in the Ashland Municipal Cemetery.

Historical information: The Madawaska Training School was established 21 February 1878 by the Maine Legislature "for the purpose of training persons to teach in the common schools of the [Madawaska] territory." Originally the school year was split between separate locations at Fort Kent and Van Buren (1879-1883) or Fort Kent and Grand Isle (1884-1887), but in 1888 the Legislature established a year-round facility at Fort Kent.

Once the school had permanently located at Fort Kent, it became necessary to provide lodging for students from other parts of the Saint John Valley. A boarding house "convenient in arrangements and sufficiently commodious for the accommodation of forty to fifty students" opened in 1893. Those staying at the boarding house paid no rent, but "they did have to bear their proportionate share of HEATING, LIGHTING, and supplying their home with water, an equivalent \$1.50 per month" (Grindle, Roger. *The University of Maine at Fort Kent: A century of progress*, p. 30).

Scope and content: This collection consists of seven framed photographs, three copies of photographs, without frames, and a document regarding general regulations for the Madawaska Training School Boarding House. The photographs are of individuals or groups of individuals representing some of the Madawaska Training School’s staff and students.
