Collection Description

<u>Historical and Biographical Information</u>

Thomas (Tom) Côté (b. 1948) is a wood carver of Acadian and French-Canadian descent. He grew up in Caswell, Maine, and, learning the craft from his mother Rena, he started carving at the age of 12. He is descended from Jean-Baptiste Côté (1832-1907), a Quebec City carver who gained prominence for his prolific work and craftsmanship.

Côté served with a U.S. Army Medevac unit during the Vietnam War. He subsequently spent several summers studying wood sculpting in Saint-Jean Port-Joli, a center for Quebec folk arts that gained wider recognition thanks to the Bourgault family of sculptors. Côté's work bears the influence of traditional French-Canadian culture and includes depictions of woodsmen, lutins (gnomes or elves), the Bonhomme sept-heures (bogeyman), and canoes and snowshoes. He has also carved eagle-head canes for aging veterans. Côté uses hand tools exclusively: mallets, chisels, and knives.

Côté has taught woodshop in local classrooms for over thirty years, offered private lessons in his workshop, and shared his craft with his grandchildren. Though he has retired from the school system, he continues to give lessons. His carvings can be found on all continents but Antarctica. His body of work extends to carved roadside panels installed in St. John Valley communities to coincide with the Acadian World Congress of 2014. He has earned the designation of Master Carver from the Maine Arts Commission. Côté resides in Limestone, Maine.

Scope and Content

The wood carvings and tools were made or collected by Thomas Côté as well as one of his granddaughters, brother, and mother. Tom's mother also made the lace tattings. Tom acquired the wooden vise but couldn't give specific information.

Ned and Rhea Gendreau donated the gray wool blanket and the two cream-colored blankets with red and blue striping to Tom when they were downsizing. Beyond this, Tom knew that two of the blankets were made in St. Leonard, N.B. and St. Denis, Quebec, respectively.

All materials are on loan from Thomas Côté to the Acadian Archives for a period of ten years.

- N/A 12 Large wooden vise with two screws
- 4 13 Bow sander for rounded materials
- 4 14 Wood-handled flat gouge with a 1.5 inch-wide blade
- Wood-handled flat gouge with a 0.75 inch-wide blade; slightly rusted
