Collection Description

Historical and Biographical Information

The World Acadian Congress or Le Congres Mondial Acadian is an international festival of Acadian and Cajun culture that is held every five years. The first Congress took place in August

1994 in New Brunswick. Each Congress lasts a week long and is filled with events and family reunions.

The 2014 Congress was the first Congress to be co-hosted by two counties-Canada and the United States. Events were held in Madawaska, Maine; Victoria, Madawaska and Restigouche counties, New Brunswick; and Temiscouata County, Quebec. Making this event successful took immense planning and cooperation from the three Quebec, New Brunswick, and Maine governments and planning committee members.

The University of Maine at Fort Kent is a four year liberal arts university that is part of the larger University of Maine System. Situated in the town of Fort Kent, UMFK is situated on the Canadian Border in the Saint John Valley, offering students and faculty an unique cultural opportunity. Fort Kent is located two towns west of Madawaska, (about a half an hour drive).

The University of Maine at Fort Kent originally started as the Madawaska Training School (MTS) which was established February 21, 1878 by the Maine Legislature "for the purpose of training persons to teach in the common schools of the [Madawaska] territory." Originally the school year was split between separate locations at Fort Kent and Van Buren (1879-1883) or Fort Kent and Grand Isle (1884-1887), but in 1888 the Legislature established a year-round facility at Fort Kent. Over the years, the Madawaska Training School would go through a number of name changes, the last of which would rebrand it as the University of Maine at Fort Kent in the 1970s. Despite its various names, the institution remained the same and continuously open and expanded its campus to accommodate growth.

Scope and Content

This collection consists of one banner commemorating the 2014 World Acadian Congress being held in the Saint John River Valley.

This banner was created as part of a contest during the 2014 World Acadian Congress. The contest consisted of having each community submit an idea for a banner that incorporated the ideas of Acadian Heritage and community. This banner was designed by Linda Masse, Anna Raymond, and others.
