Camille Daigle was born on September 5, 1909 in St. John, Maine, the son of Arthur and Christine Thibodeau Daigle. He married Odile Saucier on November 28, 1933. Daigle lived in Fort Kent Mills, Maine, and owned Camille's Restaurant. He also worked as a farmer. He retired in 1970 and in 1994 moved to Bristol, Connecticut. Daigle died on September 3, 1994.
