(All statistics are based on the new July through June figures; therefore, many numbers are reported differently than last year in order to compare FY2008 to FY2009.)

## CIRCULATION

#### Attendance

- Gate Count: 39,654 people walked through the library in FY2008 while there were 54,320 in FY2008. A 27% decrease.
- Online Count: 52,413 patrons came to the library via the web site and from off campus in FY2009 while 41,821 entered via the web in FY2008. This is a 25% increase.
- Calculated attendance differently this year by dividing the number of patrons entering the library to the number of people enrolled. In FY2008, we had increase in library usage by 9%. This year there is a decrease of 16%.

#### Hours

- Stayed open until 9pm on Fridays before Praxis exams.
  - It was noted that November and April are the two months most students take the Praxis.
- Kept the library open until 9pm the first week in the first three week summer session. Library use was minimal to none.
- Stayed open Sunday, May 31 from 1-5pm. Library use was minimal to none.
- If enrollment is low for summer FY10, then staying open extra hours will not be necessary. As was the case in FY09.

### **Circulation Statistics**

- 9,294 items were checked out in FY2009 while there were 9,855 in FY2008. A 6% decrease.
- 1,910 DVD's were checked out in FY2009 while there were 1,624 in FY2008. An 18% increase.
- 60% decrease in audiobooks use.
- 623 VHS tapes requestable through URSUS went out in FY2009 while only 84 went out in FY2008. This was a new service offered in FY2008.
- UMFK patron checkouts drop by 9%.
- Overdrive Audio books: new in March 2009. Audio books are available to download from home onto mp3 player, CD, or computer.

• From March 2009 to end of June 2009 there were 38 checkouts/downloads of audio books online.

#### In-house

• FY2009 2,134 items were counted while in FY2008 there were 3,116. A difference of -13%.

## **Courier Service**

- 1,752 items were delivered through the courier service. This is a 20% increase in delivery from the previous year of 1,659.
- Changed courier companies from Velocity to NCS Logistics. NCS to take over at the end of June, 2009.

• Received a CD/DVD cleaner and repairer.

### Maine Info Net

- 335 items were lent by Blake Library this year as opposed to last year's 295. An increase of 14%.
- 170 items were borrowed by Blake Library patrons this year while last year there were 194 items borrowed. A decrease of 12%.
- Joined Maine Info Net in a new service called Overdrive. Overdrive allows patrons to download audio books online using their existing library account.

#### **Patron Issues**

#### **Community Patrons**

- Will try to look over community patron statements this summer.
- Had problems with a couple of patrons looking at porn and developed a policy accordingly. See Book 1 Appendix E
- Stopped allowing community patrons to use quiet room.

#### Requestor

- 20% increase in lending activity. 1,048 items lent in FY2008 while 1,259 items were lent in FY2009.
- 21% decrease in borrowing activity. 1,595 items borrowed in FY2008 while 1,255 were borrowed in FY2009.
- Courtesy patrons make up a quarter of the borrowing activity (27%).

Table 3 shows the requestor lending and borrowing activity for the past two years (showing only years using July through June statistics).

#### Reserves

- 13 unique staff and 25 classes using the electronic reserves in FY2009. Last year was 16 users and 35 classes.
- 127 documents placed on electronic reserve versus 326 last year. A -61% difference.
- 2,155 times documents were viewed as opposed to last year's 6,479. A -67% difference.
- 23 unique faculty used the regular reserves, faculty used the services 29 times, 39 courses were created, and 2 non class related courses were created.

## INTERLIBRARY LOAN

#### Borrowing

- 174 items were borrowed this year compared to 161 the previous year. An 8% difference.
- Nursing materials account for 39% of the total articles borrowed or 54 of 140 (140 figure does not include cancelled or unfilled requests).

#### Lending

- In FY2009 there were 127 items loaned as opposed to 128 in FY2008. This is a difference of less than 1%.
- We loaned to 57 libraries with the public school libraries making up almost half.
